3.—Vignette: Alove, twelve gods seated in order, as judges, before a table of offerings. Below, the Psychostasia, or Weighing of the Conscience: the jackalheaded Anubis trying in the Balance the heart (conscience) of the deceased against the feather symbolical of Law; on the left, Aniand his wife in an attitude of devotion; on the right, the bis-headed Thoth, the scribe of the gods, noting down the result of the trial, and behind him the monster Amemit, the Devouert. On the left of the balance, Shai (Destiny) with the two guiddesses Remeit and Meschent behind him is above them, the soul of Ani, as a human-headed hawk, and the symbol of the cradle. Text: On the left, the address of Ani to his heart; on the right, the sentence of acquittal.





4.— L'iguette: The presentation of Ani, triumphant, to Osiris: The god enthroned within a shrine; behind him, Isis and Nephthys; in front, a lotus-flower, on which are the four children of Horus, genii of the dead. On the left, Horus leads forward Ani; who again kneels, with whitened hair, and presents offerings.

Text: The address of Horus to Osiris, announcing the righteourness of Ani; and the prayer of Ani.






5—1' gnette: Funeral procession: the mummy on a boat-shaped hearse, drawn by oxen; beside it kneels the mourning ute; in front, a priest officiates; behind follow mourners, and servants drawing a funereal shine and bearingarticles for the tumb, among which is the deceased swriting pallet

On the right, the tomb, in front of which Anabis supports the momny, the mourning wife knecking before it Facing the mum, two priests officiate before a table of offerings; behind them, a priest reads the funeral service from a papyrus, and a shaven priest brings forward an offering: the calf and cowabove symbolize the rising Son and Heaven.

(b) Ani and his wife adoring the scarab-headed god Khepera, of the morning, who is seated in the Solar Bark floating on the heaven with an altar and lotus - flower before him; two cynocephali, spirits of dawn, with their stars, raise their hands in adoration. the eye of the returning sun before them. (c) The god Tmu, the closer of the day. seated, within the Sundisk, in the Solar Bark, facing an altar with lotus-flower, (d) A couchant lion on a pedestal, embowered in lotus-flowers, among which is a serpent "Uatchit the Fiery," symbolizing the Dawn, and the Flame of tire.



(d) Ani seated before an altar, to illustrate the chapter "of not dying the second death." (e) Anubis holding the mummy of Ani, to illustrate the chapter "of not turning to corruption."










